Habitat Improvement Project Restores Historic Upland Savanna on Deep Fork WMA

Earlier this quarter, fifteen dedicated volunteers from Backcountry Hunters & Anglers (BHA), Quail Forever (QF), and the National Wild Turkey Federation (NWTF) came together for a habitat improvement effort on the Deep Fork Wildlife Management Area. With guidance from an Oklahoma Department of Wildlife Conservation (ODWC) state biologist, volunteers conducted timber stand improvement (TSI) to help restore a portion of the WMA to its historic condition as an upland savanna.

Historically, the area existed as a fire-maintained savanna with widely spaced trees, abundant grasses, and diverse understory vegetation. Decades of fire suppression gradually converted this landscape into dense, closed-canopy timber, reducing its value to many wildlife species. Restoring the savanna structure helps bring back a healthier, more diverse ecosystem.

What Was Accomplished?

Volunteers used the hack-and-squirt method—an efficient and low-impact TSI technique—to selectively treat smaller shade-producing trees. By opening the canopy, sunlight can once again reach the forest floor, allowing native grasses, forbs, and shrubs to thrive. In total, the team improved approximately 20 acres of habitat. This acreage, combined with other areas on the WMA selected by the biologist, contributes to a larger, landscape-level transformation toward savanna restoration.

What Are the Wildlife Benefits?

Restoring an upland savanna provides significant ecological benefits, including White-tailed deer - Improved forage availability and bedding cover Wild turkey - Enhanced nesting and insect-rich bugging habitat Northern bobwhite quail - Increased brood habitat and plant diversity Pollinators and beneficial insects - More flowering plants and open structure Overall biodiversity - A more resilient habitat supporting a wider range of species With these improvements, Deep Fork WMA moves closer to its historic savanna character while providing high-quality habitat for Oklahoma's wildlife.

What's Next?

This project is part of an ongoing partnership between BHA and ODWC. Additional habitat projects are already in the planning phases for 2026, continuing the shared effort to enhance public lands across the state and give volunteers more opportunities to make a meaningful impact.


Board Member - Tom Parker, Central Oklahoma


