






Our Lands: Game & Parks Property




Our Lands: Federal Land



Adam Leitschuh- Chairman



Adam was born in Colorado but spent majority of his youth growing up camping and fishing in the Sierra Nevada's of Northern California. Adam started hunting shortly after high school and expanded his opportunities after moving to Idaho to attend college at Boise State University. Adam hunted in California on summer and winter breaks until gained residency in Idaho to afford tags on a college student's budget. He spent free time around school, work and rugby schedule scouting, camping, hunting or fishing on public lands. After graduating with a construction management degree work took Adam to North Dakota and then Montana. While working on a project in Great Falls, MT Adam met his wife who is an Air Force Officer. His wife's career took Adam back to North Dakota where he helped start the North Dakota Chapter of BHA and then on to Nebraska. Adam, his wife and young son who was born in May of 2019 now reside in Plattsmouth and Adam had to stay involved with BHA. Erik Dippold- Secretary

Erik was born in Northwestern Pennsylvania on the edge of the Hickory Creek Wilderness and 500,000 acres of Allegheny National Forest. This early "backyard" forever changed his perspective and hunting and fishing followed quickly, chasing whitetail, turkeys, and small game of and fishing the cold water Allegheny. After a year in college in suburban Maryland, and joining the Navy in 1998 though, it became increasingly hard to find the time and places to wear out boots and chase critters. After a nearly 7 years, Erik found himself in Washington State and immediately started doing both again. "I figured out that the common link between the PA of my youth and Washington was easy access to public ground, and while I had a ton to learn, (What's a bonus point?!) I felt like a kid again." Since, Erik has hunted nearly every Western State for nearly every Western game animal, and came to BHA, through the Meat Eater series. "I finally got an education about what makes public land and wildlife conservation go, and had to get involved." Erik has a degree in Government and Economics from Cornell University, is an active duty Naval Aviator and a BHA life member. He is married with two little girls who love outdoor adventures, and pink princess dresses.



Casey Hunter- Treasurer



Casey is a native Nebraskan. Growing up he would split his time between Omaha and Boston as his father played for the Red Sox in the early 70's - the family lovingly refers to that time as "BC" – before cash. When Casey was not in Boston learning how to mingling with the "greats" he was back home in Omaha doing what young boys do – playing until the street lights came on. At age 9, Casey's Dad invited him on his first hunt – from then he was hooked. Yes- those hunts fed the family, but also they were the foundation of many great memories between father and son. Casey and his dad would spend every weekend of every open season together in a blind, stand or field until the time came when his dad hung up the shotgun. Casey's love of the outdoors and feeding his family from the land shifted to the streams when he discovered fishing. He developed life long relationships with his fishing buddies-whom he still fishes with 32 years later. Access to public lands and public waterways are responsible for many of Casey's closest relationships and fondest memories. Advocating for public access and keeping the sport ethical and viable for the next generation is his passion.
